Vet's Corner ...

Separation Anxiety:

'Separation Anxiety' is a general term that can cover anything from barking and whining to destroying objects whilst you are out of the house.

The proper introduction of your rescue greyhound into your home environment is critical if separation anxiety is to be kept to a minimum. Greyhounds are very intelligent, and soon pick up the correct habits if shown properly, and patiently.

As all of your home will be strange to your retired greyhound, a gradual introduction to everything should be made. I would recommend that, if at all possible, the dog should be brought home at the beginning of a holiday to allow time for this crucial introductory period. It is very important to instil confidence in your dog, in order that he / she is able to cope in your absence.

Remember ... a greyhound has never been more than a few feet away from another greyhound in his / her entire life. Please also remember that a change of circumstances may make your dog stressed and more liable to exhibit signs of separation anxiety.

Avoiding Separation Anxiety:

Many adopters are under the misapprehension that, because greyhounds spend many hours in kennels during their racing careers, they can be brought home and left, for hours on end, by themselves. This is not the case, greyhounds love company - either human, or that of other dogs and, although they can be left for short periods (longer in time), you cannot expect to bring a greyhound home one day and then leave him / her whilst you go out to work, nine 'til five the following day, without coming home to find a stressed dog, who has probably whined & barked, and probably had a toilet accident and chewed some of your belongings.

In the kennels, greyhounds are normally kennelled in pairs (usually a dog and a bitch) - they sleep together and exercise together. During the day, the kennel staff are constantly in and out - feeding, grooming and exercising the dogs, so they are used to company - both two, and four, legged!

Routine is very important to your greyhound.

To begin with, leave him / her for 5 or 10 minutes at a time to build up confidence. He / she needs to learn that you **will** return. If all is well on your return, be sure to reward with a treat. Build up the time you leave your greyhound gradually.

If you are planning on leaving your dog for more than 3 or 4 hours, you should arrange for someone to call in to give him / her a comfort break, and something to eat - this will break up their day. If greyhounds are to be left for longer periods, it may be sensible to consider adopting a pair - even then, however, settling in time must be allowed for.

With Bootsie, we find he is happier to be left in his crate - we put his muzzle on, and he is happy in there whilst we pop out for a brief time - again, we had to build this up very gradually, and now he just walks in! On the odd occasion I have to be out for a day, we have a wonderful dog-walker who takes Bootsie out - we do get a HUGE welcome upon our return! We also find that it is a good idea to leave a radio on, whilst we are out, for company.


