<u>6th Annual Greyhound Fife Dog Show – sponsored by Moffat, the Catering Equipment Company</u>

At the time of writing, there are only two weeks to go before our 6th Dog show.

The organisers are busily putting together the finishing touches, behind the scenes, to ensure another successful show. The purpose of the show has always been to raise awareness of the plight of the greyhound under the auspice of a fun dog show, which also allows us to raise much needed funds to keep our ever growing kennels going. Greyhound Rescue Fife has come a long way since its inception 8 years ago, having saved, and found forever homes for, nearly 700 dogs! This is an amazing number but, unfortunately, it is only the tip of the iceberg and, as quick as we re-home one dog, another arrives. Being one of the largest greyhound sanctuaries in the UK we depend on donations from all of our supporters, with every penny that we raise at this show going to ensure a better quality of life for our current incumbents until they find their forever homes. We hope that, once more, we can count on your valued support. Tickets, at the cheap rate of £3.50, are on sale at our kennels and at the next dog walk with the walk-in price, on the day, being £4.00.

This year's show also has a real local independent feel about it with more stalls than ever attending, many of which come from the Fife area, so why not come along and not only support GRF but also your local communities. At the time of writing we still have a couple of opportunities to get involved, even if you cannot make it along. We have two dog classes still looking for sponsorship, **Best Junior Handler & Family of Dogs** (£50 each), as well as our Trophies & Rosettes (£100 each). See our forum for full details.

Finally, just a reminder that doors open at 11:00 on the day, with the first class beginning at 11:30. Remember, we are getting the use of an indoor facility on a working farm - please respect this by ensuring that you do not drop litter, and that you clean up after your dog. There will be plenty of rubbish bags available, dotted round the room, so please use! We will have plenty of parking, but please park considerately, and where our helpers show you. We also have use of a large field, where your dogs can be walked before, during or after the show (ensure you wear your wristband at all times which will allow you freedom to go in and out).

Please note that **DOGS MUST BE ON THE LEAD AT ALL TIMES** - it will be the owners' responsibility to ensure this, and be aware of their dog at all times (especially as there will be a lot of nice tasty snacks at head height !!!!).

All that remains for me to say is that I hope to speak to as many of you as possible on the day - let's make this another roaring success for our cause :0)

The Lucky Numbers Draw was made at the walk:


Fiona advised that 59 numbers had been sold, giving us a prize fund of £118.00. This was split as £70.80 to GRF, and £47.20 to the winner.

Vet's Corner ...

Dental Health:

This piece was first published in the November 2012 Newsletter but, due to a recent request, I am re-printing it this month. Hope you find it helpful!

As puppies, greyhounds grow 28 'baby' teeth between three and six weeks of age. These, as in humans, are later replaced by the adult teeth, premolars & molars - this happens around four months of age, and the final count of adult teeth is 42.

It is highly unlikely that your rescue greyhound had any form of dental care prior to retirement from racing.

Did you know, however, that dental disease can have a significant impact on your dog's life span due to its affect on the heart, kidneys, liver and respiratory system. It starts with saliva, food residue and bacteria creating plaque on teeth which builds up along the gums, infecting the gums, bones and ligaments that support and anchor the teeth in the jaw. Some studies have shown that 80% of dogs over the age of three have dental disease. One of the 'hallmarks' most of us are familiar with is doggy breath (halitosis). Periodontal disease is progressive, usually starting as gingivitis, an infection of the gum tissue. At this point the condition is reversible with proper care. It progresses to gum recession, and eventual loss of teeth. Bacteria enters the bloodstream and can travel to your dog's vital organs.

When you adopt a dog, the state of his/her teeth is obviously something you have no control over - as said previously, it very much depends on the age of the dog, and the length of his/her racing career. Of course, and as in humans, some dogs will have stronger teeth than others.

Of course, if the state of the teeth is particularly concerning you, you should have them checked by your Vet - he/she will be able to advise if any extractions are needed, and will also be able to clean and de-scale the teeth if necessary - the down side of this, of course, is that your dog will need an anaesthetic, to which greyhounds are particularly sensitive.

The answer is to try and look after things yourself - various websites suggest different things ... knuckle bones are recommended - the shape of the bone allows the greyhound to maximise cleaning, and will preoccupy them for hours! **Remember, however, never leave your dog unsupervised with a bone of any kind.** Nylabone offer a large selection of chew products produced to assist dental health.

Of course, most important is brushing. It is important to brush your dog's teeth regularly. This should be done using a soft toothbrush and dog toothpaste (**NEVER** use human toothpaste) - your local pet shop, or Vet, will be able to advise you on this. Pets at Home, for example, give free advice in some of their larger stores. Some dogs are happier, than others, to have their teeth cleaned but it is important to persevere!

There are various sprays, drops to put in water, and types of brushes available, and it is really down to trial and error to find out what suits you, and your dog, best. We find that a 'finger toothbrush for dogs' is the easiest to use, as you have more purchase on the actual brush, as opposed to trying to manoeuvre a long handled brush. As I say, it very much depends on how willing the individual dog is to have his/her teeth brushed ... any doubts, do check with your Vet.

THIS MONTH WE ARE TALKING TO MARION, WHO LIVES IN UPPER LARGO WITH HER GREYHOUND FOXY ...

1) How long have you had Foxy?

Just over 2 joyous years. She initially sneaked in under that fallacious disguise of 'foster dog' for hydrotherapy and tlc to help mend her broken right hind leg. Celia and Jimmy had already done the hard bit of keeping her confined in a 6x6ft cage for 3 months to start the calcification process, and now she just needed gentle, regular exercise to make the leg strong again.

The hydrotherapy wasn't a great success. I've since learnt she has hydrophobia and won't willingly even paddle in the sea on a hot day, so she did well to put up with it for a few sessions. Then she realized that, if she just 'dangled' in her buoyancy jacket, we gave up and fished her out — clever dog! It took her about 6 weeks to crumble my resolve and we became her forever family.

2) How has having Foxy living with you changed your life?

I lost a beloved lurcher, Charna, back in 2008 (see In Memoriam), and my other two hounds were boys (Kim & Dylan) so I really wanted another girl. Then Celia and Jimmy had 'boy overload' at the kennels and we 'fostered' darling Bryn, who is very much a ladies' man and lost no time in making his position permanent. Now, finally, I have another girl in the family. In some ways she couldn't be more different from Charna, who was very much the lady dog, albeit with some dodgy habits, while Fi Fox is a clown and a tomboy. She makes me laugh every day and she looks after the boys, just like Charna did.

3) What is the best thing about owning a greyhound?

To be honest, I struggle to remember life without one. I had a wonderful golden retriever before I discovered hounds, and my first three were lurchers. They were all wonderful but, somehow, more self-contained than a greyhound. Maybe, because greyhounds only have humans and other greyhounds during their first formative years, they become specially attached to us and their vulnerability brings out our protective instincts. I love dogs / ...

I love dogs in general and I've often wondered why I'm so drawn to greyhounds. There's probably an element of desire to make amends for the human exploitation of greyhounds, but that applies to most rescue dogs.

Of course, they are beautiful, soft, loyal, loving, forgiving, challenging, exasperating at times, and just fab.

4) and the worst ?!?

Where to begin?! They pee and poo in elephantine amounts (mostly outside, unless there's reason for a protest), break wind, especially when you have visitors, steal food (including bird food, the butter from a dinner party table, and sandwiches from unsuspecting picnickers), scavenge the most revolting things on the beach, prefer sofas/armchairs and my bed to their own comfy dog beds, want to chase anything that moves (rabbits, squirrels, deer, the neighbours' chickens, cats and small dogs), the list is endless, and still I love them!

5) What 3 words would you use to describe Foxy?

My wee darling.

6) What advice would you give to someone, reading this article, who may be thinking of adopting a greyhound?

What are you waiting for, and why only one?? Just do it! You'll never look back.
